

Organisation structure

WA Health consists of eight separate health organisations, including the Department of Health and Health Service Providers (HSPs). Each HSP is responsible and accountable for the delivery of safe, high quality, efficient and economical health services to their local areas and communities. The Program offers the opportunity to work in one of these government health services.

What is the Aboriginal Cadetship Program?

WA Health's Aboriginal Cadetship Program offers Aboriginal university students the opportunity to have paid work experience whilst studying an undergraduate degree.

The Program provides the opportunity to develop your skills and abilities, establish personal and professional support networks, while laying foundations for a career in the WA public health sector. This is a fantastic way to discover and learn about future employment opportunities in your field of study.

Why does WA Health offer an Aboriginal Cadetship Program?

Attracting and retaining Aboriginal people to our diverse and talented workforce is essential to delivering culturally appropriate health services and improving Aboriginal health outcomes. It takes a diverse professional workforce to run a large organisation like WA Health. If you're interested in joining the other 900 Aboriginal employees already working with us, then put your hand up for this opportunity!

Growing the representation of Aboriginal people employed in the health workforce is a priority for WA Health.

Are my studies relevant?

The cadetship offers placements at various WA Health sites in the metropolitan and regional areas across a range of professions. Student nurses and midwives can apply for a placement in a cadet clinical nurse/midwife stream, or the corporate stream.



We are looking for Aboriginal university students from a range of disciplines and degrees including but not limited to:

How long is the cadetship and what is the time commitment?

Cadets are employed on a fixed term, part-time contract in one of the 8 Health Services for a period of 12 months from February 2024 to February 2025. Consideration may be given to extending a cadet's contract for the duration of their degree/studies subject to performance and meeting contract requirements.

Cadets are required to complete a total of 52 work days over a 12-month period. The 52 cadet days are made up of work days, professional development and networking events.

Am I eligible to apply for a cadetship?

To be considered for the program you must be:

- able to commit to 52 cadet days over a 12-month period of employment, starting February 2024 and finishing February 2025
- enrolled in a full-time undergraduate course at a recognised university, and have completed at least one semester but with two or more semesters to complete (equivalent/min 3 units per semester)
- identify as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander.

You are not eligible for a cadetship if you:

- have been studying for one (1) semester or less
- are undertaking a foundation or bridging and/or postgraduate studies
- are undertaking study overseas that is not part of your Australian university enrolment
- are proposing to defer any part of your study
- enrolled in a block release arrangement.

Benefits of being a cadet

As a cadet, you will be paid a part-time government level 2 salary on a fortnightly basis for 12 months and will receive the following benefits:

- income while studying (approximately \$900 to \$1000 gross income per fortnight)
- gain valuable workplace experience
- future employment pathways in the government health sector
- opportunity to discover a rewarding career in health
- grow personal and professional support networks
- Aboriginal mentoring support
- a culturally safe work environment
- leave entitlements as part of your 52 days of employment.




What are my responsibilities as a cadet?

As a cadet in health, you will be required to:

- commit to 12-months as a cadet from February 2024 to February 2025
- complete a total of 52 cadet days
- work one day a week at your assigned workplace
- attend mandatory cadet orientation and induction activities, and professional development and networking events during the year
- achieve a satisfactory standard of work performance throughout your cadetship placement
- ensure the cadetship does not conflict with or adversely impact your ability to complete your full-time study requirements – your study remains a priority
- achieve satisfactory academic results and progress in your undergraduate degree
- notify your employer immediately of any changes in your circumstances that may affect your obligations
- be aware of your responsibilities under taxation legislation (this may include seeking advice from the Australian Taxation Office or a suitably qualified taxation professional on the taxation implications of payments under the program)
- meet the requirements of your employment contract
- complete the required 3-month cadet probationary period.

Where are cadets located?

- Aboriginal cadets will be based in the metropolitan area at one of the eight Health Services in WA Health. Regional placements can be considered but would need to be negotiated.
- Cadets can be placed in various work settings including an office or hospital environment.
- Applicants are asked to consider and identify their preferred workplace as either clinical or corporate in the application form. Please note that if you are in a clinical setting you may be performing non-clinical tasks and duties relevant to your role.
- Nursing and midwife cadets can select a corporate or clinical (hospital based) work site.
- Applicants should consider nominating a preferred workplace based on their place of residence or study for ease of travel.
- If you are successful in being offered a cadetship, we will aim to place you in a Health Service that best aligns with your area of study and interests.



Are my course fees paid under the Program?

- No. course fees are not included.
- Cadets are responsible for paying their own course fees and book/equipment cost (HECS-HELP or FEE-HELP). Please speak to your university about other sources of financial assistance.

Will my Centrelink payments be affected?

If you receive Centrelink payments then you must advise Centrelink immediately upon being accepted into the Cadetship Program, as it may affect your payments. For more information visit www.centrelink.gov.au

What happens when I complete my studies?

- Once you have completed your university course, you will need to provide a copy of your final academic transcript to your employer to **finalise** your cadetship and confirm your completion.
- Your employer will **endeavour** to support your transition to employment, however a job placement is not quaranteed.
- We encourage cadets who will be graduating to consider applying for a graduate development program.

What if I defer my studies?

You must notify your employer immediately as this will affect your participation in the Program. Your payments will also be affected.

Application instructions

Close of applications

The closing date for applications is **4:00pm**, **Friday 13 October 2023**. Any applications received after this date will not be considered.

Preparing your application

- Update your resume to include work history. Summarise your experience. Include the name and contact details of a person who can provide either a work or character reference for you. We will also consider an applicant's relevant life experience, not just study and work experience.
- If you do not have a work history, try to include details of any groups and/or projects that you have been involved in either at school/university or in the community and include the details in the resume.
- Start drafting your response to each of the application questions in the Cadet Application Questions form. The 5 questions are listed below. Remember this must be no more than 2 pages in length.
- Gather copies of your transcripts of academic results and confirmation of enrolment to submit with your application.
- Speak to the contact person listed on the advertisement if you have any questions. This person can provide you with a lot more information and give you a better understanding of the role and requirements.

Application questions

Applicants need to complete the Cadet Application Questions form and provide a brief and succinct response to the 5 application questions, in no more than 2 pages. The Cadet Application Questions form is attached to the advertisement. This completed form must be submitted with your online application.

- 1. As an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander, who is your community and/or who is your family/mob and where are they from? (Aboriginality is a genuine occupational requirement of being a cadet and is authorised under Section 50d of the Equal Opportunity Act 1984).
- 2. Why would you like to be considered for an Aboriginal cadetship in WA Health?
- 3. What are your career goals after you graduate?
- 4. Give an example of when you have acted as a role model?
- 5. If you were successful in receiving a cadetship, describe how you would manage your cadet work schedule, study program and personal/family commitments through your cadetship?

When you are ready to submit your application, click on the link in the advertisement. You will be asked to complete an online application form and attach the following documents:

- 1. Application questions complete the Cadet Application Questions form found as an attachment in the advertisement.
- 2. Current resume, which summarises your experience and includes a work or character reference.
- 3. Proof of enrolment in a university degree.
- 4. Academic transcript.

Documents should be saved in MS Word (.doc files only) or PDF format.

Please ensure you allow plenty of time to submit your application and accompanying 4 documents to allow for unanticipated problems, as late applications will not be accepted.

What happens with my application?

Once your application is received, the selection panel will assess your application. After assessing your application, you may be invited to attend an interview to discuss the program further. You will be contacted by phone and advised by email about the interview details. Interviews are likely to take place in late October/early November.

Attending your interview

You may find the following points useful, when attending your interview:

- Don't be late, plan your journey.
- Remember the interview is an exchange of information and an opportunity to get to know you better. We want you to feel as relaxed as possible and encourage you to ask questions or clarify information.
- Take your time, present your answers clearly and concisely.
- Take a copy of your application and any notes that you have prepared to assist you in the interview.

After the interview, the panel will assess all the information gathered. All applicants will be notified of the outcome electronically in December.

If you have not been successful, you will be given the opportunity to obtain feedback regarding your application. We strongly encourage you to phone the contact person, as the information may be valuable to you and may help you improve your application, when looking for future cadet opportunities.

WA Health require applicants to undertake criminal records screening and integrity checking as part of the appointment process. A pre-employment health assessment (PEHA) may be required by some employers before starting work.

Choosing a cadet workplace
